The New Colossus is the poem you can find on a plaque at the Statue of Liberty (www.nps.gov/stli/index.htm) in New York City harbour, the first port of call for many immigrants to America. What message is 'this mighty woman' communicating, and to whom?

If you had to condense the message of the poem into three words, what would they be? What colour is this poem? If you had to act out this poem without any words, how would you do it? What gestures would you use? How would you arrange yourselves into groups or tableaux?

Do you have any relatives who emigrated to America in the past? If not America, then what about family members who came to the UK, or those who left? What are their stories? What might their first days in their new homes have been like?

If the Statue of Liberty is The New Colossus, who is the Old Colossus?

Start here: https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/ Colossus_of_Rhodes. What message is Colossus communicating, and to whom? If you could commission a statue to stand outside your school gates, what sort of statue would you have? What poem on a plaque would you fix to it? Write that poem.
