

Matt Abbott, Bloomsbury Education



Dean Atta, Hodder Children's Books



Sarah Crossan, Bloomsbury YA



There are few writers who have Crossan's forensic ability to expose human cruelty, not so much as active evil or villainy but as indifference to the needs of others or the deflection of our own incapacity and instability onto those who need our care. Both perpetrators and victims are 'people running away or struggling to stay put', as Allison puts it in another context.


